naturally produced and artificially propagated, UCR steelhead associated with two new studies, Study 3 and Study 4. Study 3 involves routine spawning ground surveys in the Entiat River Basin designed to estimate the numbers of adult salmonids utilizing the basin. Study 4 is designed to evaluate the feasibility of restoring endangered UCR steelhead above barriers in Icicle Creek, a tributary to the Wenatchee River. Modification 1 was issued on April 22, 1999, and is valid for the duration of the permit, which expires on December 31, 2002.

Notice was published on January 4, 1999 (64 FR 148), that COE-WES applied for a 3-year permit to take and conduct research on endangered shortnose sturgeon to characterize the Ogeechee River system shortnose sturgeon population size, age, structure and growth; document seasonal movement and habitat preferences; identify, if possible, spawning and rearing sites and develop population models to evaluate anthropogenic effects, population trends, and define a recovering or steady-state population. Permit 1189 was issued on April 22. 1999, and expires on December 31,
