Each issuer will then be subject to a reconciliation process at the end of the benefit year to ensure that each issuer is reimbursed only for cost sharing reductions provided. This revised collection establishes the data elements that a QHP issuer would be required to report to HHS in order to establish the cost-sharing reductions provided on behalf of enrollees for the benefit year.
